#### **COVID-19 VACCINE MANDATE LIFTED**

After evaluating current public health guidance, and in consultation with our own medical and public health experts, The University of New Mexico will no longer require the COVID-19 primary vaccine series for students and employees. UNM Health and Health Sciences programs and clinical areas will continue to maintain their COVID-19 vaccine requirements. We continue to strongly recommend that the entire Lobo community should keep up to date with vaccinations, stay at home if sick, and follow CDC guidelines for all COVID-19 matters. What this means in practice is:

- Individuals with a hire date of March 13, 2023, or later are no longer required to provide proof of vaccination or apply for an exemption
- Students enrolling in classes after March 13, 2023, are no longer required to provide proof of vaccination or apply for an exemption
- UNM will no longer require students, faculty, and staff to report COVID-19-positive tests through the online portal or upload COVID-19 vaccination records

We have also retired the Bring Back the Pack website and instead are linking to <u>COVID-19 Updates and Answers</u> from the home page banner. Here you will find Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) and be able to submit your own questions.

#### WOMEN IN STEM SCHOLARSHIPS

Women continue to be underrepresented in STEM and tend to face more obstacles in their education and career. This scholarship is designed to assist and encourage young women pursuing a STEM career. This year NMOST will be awarding scholarships between \$500 and \$1000. NMOST does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, ancestry, disability, national or ethnic origin, religious belief, gender expression and identity, marital or veteran status.

Applicants for the Advancing Young Women in STEM scholarship must:

- Be a young woman (25 or younger) pursuing a STEM education/career
- Be a resident of New Mexico OR currently enrolled in a New Mexico college/university
- Be a high school junior/senior applying for college/university in STEM, OR a current undergraduate in STEM
- Have a minimum 2.5 cumulative GPA based on a 4.0 scale
- Repeat applications are welcome, previous awardees are ineligible

# MAY IS ASIAN-AMERICAN, NATIVE HAWAIIAN & PACIFIC ISLANDER HERITAGE MONTH

Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander Heritage Month is observed annually in May to celebrate the contributions that generations of AAPIs have made to American history, society, and culture. Originating with Congress in 1977, the month of May was chosen for AAPI Heritage Month to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants. The theme for 2023 is **Advancing Leaders Through Opportunity**. This year's theme is the start of the new theme series for 2021–2024 highlighting the Federal Asian Pacific American Council's efforts in advancing leaders. #### **Admissions**

The Office of Admissions can help if you have questions or are ready to apply to UNM-Los Alamos. The Office of Admissions can provide application instructions for degree-seeking, non-degree, dual credit/concurrent, international, senior, or transfer students. Complete details can be found on the Admissions page: losalamos.unm.edu/admissions.

#### **Financial Aid**

The Office of Financial Aid provides information on financial resources available to degree-seeking students. These resources may include scholarships, grants, and loans from the federal or state government, independent organizations, and/or UNM-LA itself. UNM-LA determines financial aid eligibility from the FAFSA, so please take time to file this document on line every year. Don't assume you are ineligible—there are many opportunities to pursue.

#### **Enrollment Services**

The Office of Enrollment Services at UNM-LA processes high school and other college transcripts for admissions and maintains transcripts of current and former students. The registrar can also answer questions about dual credit and concurrent enrollment, VA benefits, and graduation requirements.

#### **Academic Advising & Student Success**

Academic advisors can provide guidance through the admission process, degree and course selection, and registration. Advisors also assist with changing a major, following up instructors' early alerts, filing graduation petitions, and planning for baccalaureate work. Advisors can also help resolve registration errors. Degree-seeking students must meet with an advisor before registering for each semester to check that their chosen classes will continue to make progress toward their degrees and to have their advising hold lifted. The Academic Student Success Manager coordinates ADA accommodation services for students, and oversees academic advisement, student retention, and success initiatives.

#### Career Services

Student Services offers career services to assist students with self-exploration, selecting a major, and opportunities for gaining experience in their chosen fields. Career services also include resume reviews, internship connections, job fairs, quantifying or translating skills, sharing job postings, and building connections between employers and our students.
