MEET SBDC DIRECTOR JANICE KRISH



Janice is the new director of the Small Business Development Center (SBDC), located on the lower level of Building 7 of the UNM-Los Alamos campus. The purpose of the SBDC is to guide entrepreneurs who are planning to start businesses in Los Alamos County.

We often meet people who appreciate the land and people of Northern New Mexico, but Janice is one of those rare individuals who pulled up her roots and moved to New Mexico without a job or connections because she fell in love with the blue skies, adobes, and culture of Santa Fe. Originally from Connecticut and educated at the University of Vermont (BA) and Wesleyan University (MA), she started and eventually sold a laser printer business, then decided to take a road trip to see the American Southwest.

She had never given much thought about Santa Fe: "All I knew was that Santa Fe was the capital of New Mexico." But once she saw the piñons and the open skies she was captivated. "I'm an East Coast girl but have a Southwest soul," she explains. "I love hiking to mountain vistas and being free."

Janice moved to Santa Fe, taking with her only what could fit in her old BMW: her basset hound, computer, and some camping equipment. Her condo was originally fitted out with camping furniture.

Janice worked for a time for New Mexico State Parks, and her favorite way to enjoy the state is to take her camper van to a local lake or river. Her travel companions are her dog, Cannoli, and her bunny, Bebop. This trio is drawn to the water, and you can find them camping at Cochiti Lake, Abiquiu Lake, or one of the local hot springs.

When camping season ends, Janice enjoys skiing at Pajarito Mountain or snowshoeing in the wilderness and the epic mountain views of Los Alamos.

When she isn't exploring, Janice focuses on the unique challenges and opportunities that a person aspiring to start a business in Los Alamos faces. She has a compelling vision of the future of our county and wholeheartedly believes it can once again enjoy a vibrant commercial life. BLACK HISTORY MONTH: HERBERT LEE WRIGHT



February is Black History Month in the United States. This year, we want to recognize a true pioneer in civil rights – Herbert Lee Wright.

Wright was born in Houston on October 3, 1927. He was a promising student, but he decided to support his country by enlisting in the US Army during World War II. He was trained in the skills necessary to become a smokejumper and paratrooper. He was eventually recruited into the elite, all-Black 555th Parachute Infantry Battalion, known as "The Triple Nickels." He served with distinction, and he returned to the United States ready to continue his education. Wright selected The University of New Mexico because he knew it offered opportunities for student leadership. He double majored in biology and political science.

Wright was elected as the first Black student body president in New Mexico history. While running, he learned that several local businesses would not serve Black students. When he read that a restaurant called Oklahoma Joe's refused service to George Long, he contacted the NAACP for help in organizing a boycott. He later called for boycotts of several more businesses. His actions soon inspired the Albuquerque City Council to pass an ordinance, drafted by Wright and Long, guaranteeing access for all to places of public accommodation. Passed in 1952, this was one of the earliest laws of this kind in the country.

Upon graduating, Wright was named the NAACP's National Youth Leader. In this role, he supported many of the early actions of the national Civil Rights Movement, such as the Montgomery Bus Boycott the desegregation efforts of the Little Rock Nine. Wright advocated a national law modeled on the one he helped draft for the City of Albuquerque.

Wright left the NAACP in 1962, possibly because he had been radicalized by his friend Malcolm X and had started to see it as too cautious and institutional. He did, however, continue to speak out for civil rights.

Wright died in 2020 due to complication of COVID 19. He will always be remembered as one of UNM's most influential voices for the neglected and oppressed.

Admissions

The Office of Admissions can help if you have questions or are ready to apply to UNM-Los Alamos. The Office of Admissions can provide application instructions for degree-seeking, non-degree, dual credit/concurrent, international, senior, or transfer students. Complete details can be found on the Admissions page: losalamos.unm.edu/admissions.

Financial Aid

The Office of Financial Aid provides information on financial resources available to degree-seeking students. These resources may include scholarships, grants, and loans from the federal or state government, independent organizations, and/or UNM-LA itself. UNM-LA determines financial aid eligibility from the FAFSA, so please take time to file this document online every year. Don't assume you are ineligible—there are many opportunities to pursue.

Enrollment Services

The Office of Enrollment Services at UNM-LA processes high school and other college transcripts of current and former students. The registrar can also answer questions about dual credit and concurrent enrollment, VA benefits, and graduation requirements.

Academic Advising & Student Success

Academic advisors can provide guidance through the admission process, degree and course selection, and registration. Advisors also assist with changing a major, following up instructors' early alerts, filing graduation petitions, and planning for baccalaureate work. Advisors can also help resolve registration errors. Degree-seeking students must meet with an advisor before registering for each semester to check that their chosen classes will continue to make progress toward their degrees and to have their advising hold lifted. The Director of Student Affairs coordinates ADA accommodation services for students, and oversees academic advisement, student retention, and success initiatives.

Career Services

Student Services offers career services to assist students with self-exploration, selecting a major, and opportunities for gaining experience in their chosen fields. Career services also include resume reviews, internship connections, job fairs, quantifying or translating skills, sharing job postings, and building connections between employers and our students.
